


Why is Transportation System Performance Important to You?

What Is the Transportation Planning Process?

- A process that....
 - Analyzes existing and expected future (20 to 30 years) transportation system conditions
 - Identifies both long-term and short-range passenger and freight improvements
 - Prioritizes projects
 - Results in a transportation plan and an investment program



Who Does

Transportation Planning?

 Transportation planning involves many different organizations, groups and individuals...each having a stake in making the transportation system as effective as possible.



Public Agency Participation

- Although there are many public agencies that participate in transportation planning, two agencies, in particular, play critical roles:
 - State department of transportation (DOT)
 - Metropolitan planning organization (MPO)



State DOT Role in Planning Process

- Provides and maintains transportation infrastructure under public ownership at the state level
- Partners with local governments for many transportation projects
- Develops statewide transportation plan and state transportation improvement program



Invest in What?

- Managing Existing Facilities and Systems
- New Capacity (either through new facilities or improving existing ones)
- Improved Access to Freight Facilities
- Enhanced Communication and Signing
- Coordinated Land Use Strategies





- Improved road connections to intermodal facilities
- Ramps and other street improvements
- Transit (for employee access)





Enhanced

Communication and Signing

- Operational improvements through signing
- Pre-trip information
- Real-time congestion reporting





Coordinated Land Use Strategies

- Avoid clash of land uses
- Create buffers
- Preserve space for future expansion
- Reserve right-of-way

- To your industry by promoting investments of importance to you
