






- Corporal Derence Jack Road, Traffic Signal and Turn Lanes
- Diagonal Parking along eastside
- Consolidate Crosswalks and signalize
- Garapan, turn pockets and signal modifications










Route 36 – Windward – Talofofo Road Improvements
